Illinois contains the link between the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River, and is bounded by the Mississippi and Ohio rivers and Lake Michigan. These incredible waterway resources make Illinois the keystone of America's inland waterways system, and one of the top maritime states in the country.

Illinois' robust maritime industry was foundational to building the state's economy in its early days and is critical to the future of sustainable commerce. Thousands of Illinoisans are employed in the maritime industry, moving millions of tons of Midwestern agricultural products every year. These are jobs that cannot be exported, thanks to the Jones Act, which requires vessels in domestic commerce to be owned, built, and crewed by Americans.

Moving goods by barge is the most fuel-efficient mode of transportation. This means less greenhouse gases emitted and cleaner air for Illinois citizens. In addition to being the most environmentally sustainable form of freight transportation, maritime is also the safest; moving cargo off our highways and rails and onto the water reduces traffic fatalities and congestion.



Over 77 million tons of freight move on Illinois' waterways every year. The state's waterways system is a critical link in the efficient movement of products that we use every day.



More than \$13 billion worth of freight is moved on Illinois' 1,100 miles of navigable waterways each year.

Nearly \$2 billion worth of grain is moved by barge in Illinois every year, feeding people all over the country and the world.





The maritime industry provides thousands of good paying jobs in Illinois. These non-exportable jobs offer a strong ladder of advancement without the need for a college degree or college debt.


Thanks to the Jones Act, goods moved on Illinois waters are moved by Americanowned, American-crewed, and Americanbuilt vessels. These vessels are the eyes and ears of the waterways - helping provide security to the nation.

Towboat captains are licensed every 5 years by the Coast Guard and have a minimum of 11,520 hours of training – more than a commercial airline pilot.
